BACKGROUND

Each year GHSC, in association with various partners and NGOs, organizes the Global Health Supply Chain Summit (GHSCS). In continuation of the association's work to provide access to peer learning in Supply Chain Management for members, IAPHL offers every year a scholarship to Supply Chain (SC) professional from low income country. It is in this context that for this year's summit, IAPHL has decided to sponsor five of these members to participate in the 11th Global Health Supply Chain Summit (GHSC) to be held from November 28-30, 2018 in Zambia. The sponsorship provided for registration, transportation, meals, and accommodation. We applied and were selected to receive this scholarship and participate in this important event. The theme of the summit was "Accelerating Global Health Supply Chain Excellence: Better Supply Chain Design System, Innovative Financing for Health and New Technologies & Integrated Information Systems".

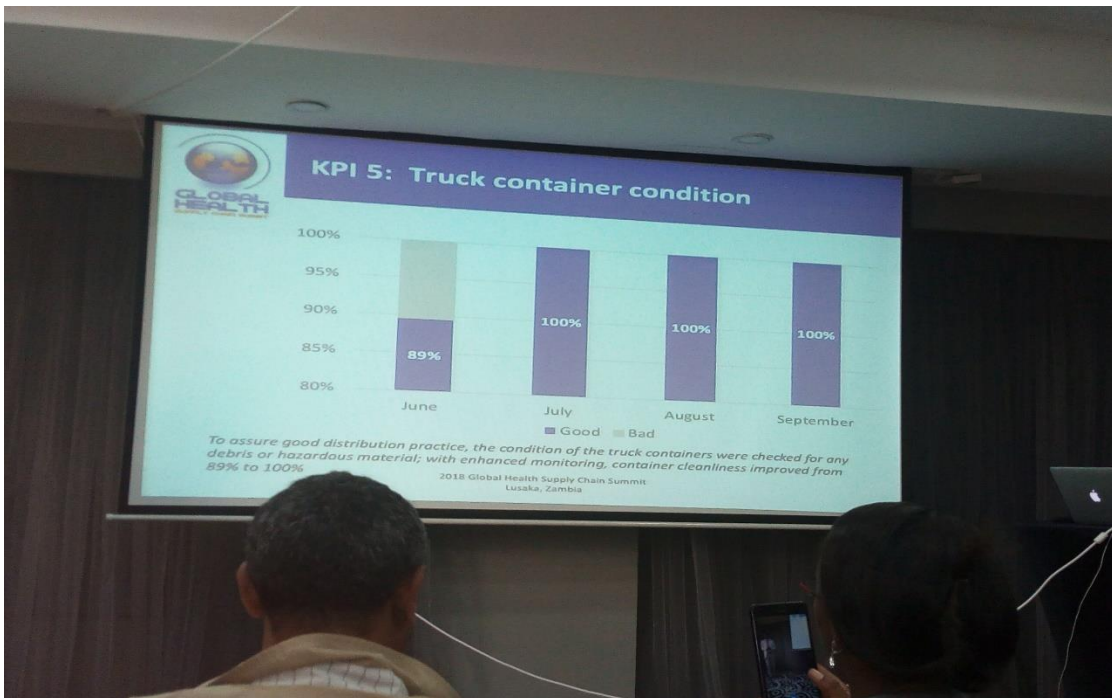
LESSONS LEARNED/KEY TAKEAWAYS
